Labor Summer Research Program 2020 Earners and Learners in Los Angeles County

Students engage in applied research focused on the social, economic, and political context and experiences of “earners and learners,” or those who work and attend college in Los Angeles County. We will examine how working students’ navigate barriers and opportunities in fulfilling their career and other goals.

Participants will be a part of a UCLA Labor Center study to assess the intersections and the costs of working and attending school. Applied research methodologies (data collection, quantitative and qualitative data analysis) and engagement with key stakeholders such as earners and learners, school administrators, policymakers and advocates through info-graphics and interactive data workshops.

This program fulfills the Labor Studies Major Capstone Requirement.

The LCS Fellowship is a program organized jointly by Georgetown University's Kalmanovitz Initiative and Heartland Capital Strategies. The program places up to 10 students in an 8-week field practicum with financial organizations that oversee responsible investment funds and capital stewardship. Past participating organizations have included KPS Capital Partners, Segal Marco, ULLICO, Blue Wolf Capital Partners, LIUNA, AFL-CIO HIT, Teamsters, Hamilton Lane, Change to Win Investment Group, The Sterling Organization, and GCM Grosvenor. A \$6000 stipend is provided to assist with housing/transportation costs.

This program is open to students from across the nation who will be rising sophomores, juniors or seniors of any major, but the focus of the work is broadly financial. The occasional graduate student will be accepted as well.

Immigrant Justice Fellowship

The Immigrant Justice Fellowship (IJF) is a project of the UCLA Labor Center's Dream Resource Center (DRC). IJF is a California rapid response fellowship that aims to: (1) center the voices and experiences of undocumented immigrant youth in the immigrant rights movement, (2) protect and defend undocumented communities from mass detention and deportation, and (3) create a welcoming, healthy, and just society for immigrants. IJF strengthens community-led and trauma-informed rapid response networks by creating a partnership between immigrant youth leaders, on-the-ground organizations, and the Dream Resource Center.

Five immigrant youth, rooted in directly impacted communities, are selected to participate in this full-time fellowship that occurs from April 2020 to March 2021. Each fellow is provided a monthly fellowship award of \$4,000. Throughout the fellowship, fellows:

- Conduct educational activities to increase community knowledge on their constitutional rights, options, and resources when confronting detention and deportation.
- Improve access to mental health services for immigrants.
- Increase community oversight and accountability of detention centers and Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE).

For the 2020 Immigrant Justice Fellowship, each fellow will be placed at one of the following partner organizations:

- Orange County Fellow at Resilience Orange County (ROC)
- Inland Empire Fellow at Inland Coalition for Immigrant Justice (ICIJ)
- Inland Empire Fellow at Black Alliance for Just Immigration (BAJI)
- Fresno Fellow at Central Valley Immigrant Integration Collaboration (CVIIC)
- San Diego Fellow, Partner Organization TBD

Dream Summer Fellowship

The Dream Summer Fellowship is an annual program of the UCLA Dream Resource Center founded in 2011. Over the past nine years, Dream Summer has provided over 694 fellowship opportunities to immigrant youth and allies and has partnered with over 250 social justice organizations across the country. Dream Summer:

- Empowers immigrant youth to be the next generation of social justice leaders through leadership and professional development, movement building, and on-the-ground experience in social justice organizations.
- Creates safe and healing spaces for immigrant youth to connect and build with one another.
- Promotes an intersectional, cross-racial, and intergenerational approach to social justice that addresses the needs of immigrant communities.

Participants are placed within social justice-based organizations and work closely with their host organization to incorporate and strengthen the role of immigrant issues alongside the organization's social justice work. Over the summer, fellows engage and lead social justice efforts by aligning the call for immigrant rights issues alongside the unique challenges of queer and transgender communities, Asian and Pacific Islander communities, Black immigrant communities, the ongoing mass incarceration and criminalization of people of color, worker rights, and health care access for all. Dream Summer fellows receive a \$5,000 fellowship award for their participation in the program, leadership and professional development trainings, and become part of a national alumni network of over 650 immigrant rights leaders.

Occupational Health Internship Program

The Occupational Health Internship Program (OHIP) is a full time, paid summer internship designed to link the skills and interests of students with the needs of workers employed in an under-served or high hazard job. Teams of two interns are assigned to a union or worker organization where they receive supervision from a designated staff member and an academic mentor. OHIP has training sites across the country including: the San Francisco Bay Area, Los Angeles, Chicago, Boston, and New York City. New sites for 2020 include Denver, New Orleans, Philadelphia, and Pittsburgh.
